You may think that Spring and Summer are the seasons for flowers, but many plants are not deterred by the winter chill. Visit the Camellia Walk to see Azaleas, Camellias and Fried Egg Plant Gordonia axillaris in flower. There are more than 50 species and varieties of Camellias in these gardens. Camellias and Gordonias are in the plant family Theaceae. This family is named for its most valuable Camellia, the Tea bush. Camellias have been grown in China and Japan for millenia and tea has been drunk since 2737 BC, according to legend.


